Subject: FY 2019 GYCC Project Selection

I am pleased to announce the projects selected by the Greater Yellowstone Coordinating Committee (GYCC) to receive funding for fiscal year 2019. For FY19, 24 project proposals were submitted, for a total funding request of about \$384,000. Fifteen projects are recommended for funding in amounts ranging from \$5,000 to \$25,000, for a total pool of \$185,000. These awards are contingent on actual FY19 agency budgets. Next year it is our intent to return to \$250,000 in project dollars for FY20.

The GYCC has established long term strategic goals of *Ecosystem Health*, and *Connecting People to the Land*, with near term focus areas of *visitor and community use*, and *wildlife migration*.

The GYCC executives made final decisions after reviewing evaluations from the subcommittees and the GYCC Coordinator, using the following criteria:

- Strategic fit: How well does the project address GYCC priorities?
- Scope: To what extent does the project build partnerships and leverage funds?
- Leverage resources: To what extent does the project result in internal partnerships between units or result in wide-scale benefits for the Greater Yellowstone Area?
- Awareness: How well does this project increase public awareness of the cross-boundary coordination of the GYCC and subcommittees?

The GYCC Coordinator will work with your staff to prepare agreements and other necessary documentation needed to make funds available for each project. Project reports are due to the GYCC Coordinator by February 1, 2019 for 2018 projects.

Once again, I thank all who prepared a proposal. Many more excellent projects were submitted than could be funded, and I extend my sincere thanks to all who participated in the subcommittee review of proposals. I look forward to the results of the 2019 GYCC projects.
